The DC Council unanimously passed the FY 2016 budget on May 27, 2015. The budget is much more than a first step in addressing homelessness and affordable housing deficits. It is a leap forward:

- Capital funds that will support the replacement of DC General shelter.
- Assistance for more than 450 families to leave shelter for transitional housing.
- A Daytime Services Center for homeless individuals.
- Housing for 365 individuals and 110 families who have significant disabling conditions.
- Assistance for homeless pregnant/parenting teens under 18.
- \$100 million for the Housing Production Trust Fund to build and renovate affordable housing.
- Income and employment assistance for one additional year for families aging out of Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF).

The Mayor and the Council said "yes" to investment in opportunities, support and pathways for our neighbors who have long been poor and marginalized. Our neighbors, all children of God.

**Now** the challenge and difficult work of making the vision of a community where everyone has what they need a reality is front and center! There has never been a better time to undertake this work. The challenge is in the moment; the time is always now.
